

## Meet Our Keynote Speaker

**Melissa Wiley** is an author, blogger, and homeschooling mother of six. She's been blogging about their tidal homeschooling adventures at "Here in the Bonny Glen" since 2005. She is @melissawiley on Twitter and @bonnyglen on Instagram. She loves fountain pens, snail mail, traveler's notebooks, booklists, and Monty Python. Most of all, she loves a good read-aloud!

The spring of 1995 was a landmark time for Melissa: first baby, first book contract, and first modem. By the time that baby was crawling, she had discovered the AOL homeschooling boards and *Growing Without Schooling* magazine. She knew right away that homeschooling was for her family. They were gung ho from the start.

Twenty-two years later, that baby is studying linguistics at Cal Poly and there are five more kids behind her—ages 19, 16, 13, 11, and 8 (four girls and two boys altogether). They recently moved to Portland, Oregon, after nearly 11 years in Southern California. Her husband Scott writes comic books and she writes children's books—mostly historical fiction and early readers, including *The Prairie Thief*, *Fox and Crow Are Not Friends*, and the Inch and Roly series. Their freelance lifestyle allows a lot of flexibility for family homeschooling adventures.

Melissa calls their educational style "Tidal Homeschooling," a term she coined to describe her family's ebb-and-flow homeschooling rhythms. They alternate periods of concen-

trated, literature-based studies with periods of unschoolish, interest-driven meanderings. These rhythms have worked well for their family for many years and allow a lot of free time for their various passions, including gaming (especially Minecraft and Stardew Valley), sketching, and butterfly gardening.

In her keynote address, "Tidal Homeschooling: The Ebb and Flow of Joyful Learning," Melissa will speak about what "high tide" and "low tide" look like and why her primary goal is to maintain an atmosphere of curious inquiry, joy, and fun.

Melissa is also sharing her stories in four other sessions. "Comics Make You Smart" will examine the ways that comics can quietly improve reading comprehension, vocabulary, and storytelling skills. In "Makers Gotta Mess," Melissa shares a variety of tips, resources, and practical advice for building spaces and schedules that foster creativity and inventiveness. "Books for Breakfast, Literature for Lunch" shares Melissa's best strategies for bringing any subject to life with captivating literature and includes tips for finding great booklists, doing character voices, and engaging energetic little ones.

Finally, in "Habits in the Homeschool," Melissa demonstrates how families can work together with playful spirits to build positive habits that support a lifestyle of learning and family harmony.

## Meet Our Featured Speaker

**Justin Young**—a professional performer in the entertainment industry since the age of 10—has lent his voice as an announcer/actor to companies such as ESPN, Liberty Tax, Blue Cross/Blue Shield, Monster Energy Drink, and Busch Gardens Howl-O-Scream, as well as to video games, documentaries, and more. Justin is also an acting and vocal coach for teens and a published singer/songwriter; in addition, he served as the musical director for Broadway Disney's national pre-release production of *The Little Mermaid* in Norfolk, Virginia.

Justin started his adventure in public speaking after friends asked him to speak to their youth groups about his experiences growing up in the entertainment world. His storytelling captures the attention of his audience and has them on the edges of their seats in suspense, waiting for more.

Have your teens join Justin in a session on how to "Embrace the Inner Nerd," which includes topics such as self-esteem, bullying, self-acceptance,

dealing with differences, what it means to be a hero, choices and their consequences, and the secret to happiness. "Creatively Writing Creative Creations" helps teens capture the story ideas running through their heads with a combination of Justin's amazing stories and some fun individual exercises. Through personal anecdotes and individual and group exercises, "Excuse Me . . . Who Am I?" will teach teens how to remove all the labels put on them and will give them the inspiration to discover, accept, and love their true selves.

Through decades of experience and years of study, Justin's message of self-acceptance and being true to one's self has resonated with teens and adults in every community. His deeply personal stories and unique and entertaining delivery style reach even the most distracted student. Justin resides in Virginia Beach with his wife and three children. Each session is sure to inspire and motivate your teens, even those who are the most reluctant to learn!



#### FRIDAY, SESSION 1, 1–2 p.m.

##### F1.1 Makers Gotta Mess

##### F1.2 Finding Your Way Through the FAFSA

Does the thought of filling out financial aid forms fill you with dread? Are you convinced you won't qualify for financial aid, so don't know why you should bother with the hassle? Despite our inclination to avoid government paperwork or our reluctance to disclose personal information, almost everyone with a college-bound student should fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Even wealthy students may be required to file to receive their merit scholarships or to be enrolled in a workstudy program at their college or university. Filling out the FAFSA is actually very easy if you're prepared, and the potential benefits are almost certainly greater than the inconvenience. In this

session, Mark can answer your questions and help you navigate the process and avoid common mistakes. Spending 15 minutes on the FAFSA could save you thousands of dollars!

##### F1.3 Write Your Family History: Six Easy Ways to Start and Seven Great Ways to Share

### **Keynote Address— Tidal Homeschooling: The Ebb and Flow of Joyful Learning**

When she first started homeschooling, Melissa Wiley spent a lot of time trying to determine what kind of label fit her family best—Charlotte Mason? Unschooling? Eclectic? Gradually she realized there was a pattern to how her family learned and lived: an organic rhythm of “high tides” and “low tides,” each with its own character and activities. In Melissa’s keynote address, we’ll explore the tidal homeschooling lifestyle and discover how the metaphor can be useful in shaping joyful learning adventures for your family.

## **SATURDAY, SESSION 3, 1:15–2:15 p.m.**

### **S3.1 Embrace the Inner Nerd**

Do you ever feel trapped between being who you really are and who you want people to think you are? Do you think that it’s easier to “go with the flow” than to be singled out, made fun of, laughed at, or mocked for being “different?” Do you just go on pretending, instead of living? Join Justin as he takes you on an emotional roller coaster ride of crazy stories from his childhood and thought-provoking experiences that will help you understand that true beauty lies in what makes us different. He will inspire you to discover, create, and embrace who you really are and empower you to be true to that “inner you” ... and release your “inner hero.”

### **S3.2 Teaching Classical Literature with Cinema**

### **S3.3 Better Late Than Early: Effective Whole Child Learning for Ages 3–7**

We’re so excited about starting our preschoolers, kindergarteners, and primary-age kids with homeschooling! Shouldn’t we do what schools are doing? Most schools and preschools have pushed workbooks, reading lessons, and pencil-to-paper math lessons to younger and younger ages, even though the latest research and child development experts say early formal academic lessons hurt kids academically in the long run. What to do instead? You’re a homeschooler! You can help your children learn holistically, integrating learning into daily life and meeting your child’s stage of development with exquisite timing, rather than risking burnout. This session will explore both why and how to help our youngest children learn in ways that are right for them and their stage of development.

### **S3.4 Beginning Homeschooling, Part 2: But What Do I Do Monday?**
